You are subject to the drug & alcohol testing upon arrival to the TCCC campus and randomly thereafter. ***If you test positive for drugs or alcohol, you will be disqualified from entering the program and asked to leave the program immediately at your own expense.***

Projects with compelling need are ever present and we are preparing to meet those needs with your help. This is a very exciting time for the National Service movement and we are thrilled that you are joining us!

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## **Tahsanchat Cooper, *Program Director***

Tahsanchat Cooper is the Program Director of Hoopa TCCC and the Hoopa AmeriCorps on Native Lands Program. She is a member of the Hoopa Valley Tribe and a descendant of the Yurok, Karuk and Redwood Creek Tribes of Northern California. She was born on the Hoopa Indian reservation, although she was raised off-reservation in Santa Rosa, CA by her mother and stepfather with three other siblings. She relocated to the Hoopa Valley Indian Reservation in 1997, where she currently resides with her husband and four children.

**Tahsanchat has been with TCCC since it's conception in August 2000.** She began as the Administrative Assistant to the Director, later promoted to Assistant Director. She continues to lead the program to new heights with her great leadership skills. In February 2010, she was promoted to Program Director for two Hoopa AmeriCorps programs


Prior to the start of TCCC, Tahsanchat gained most of her experience while working for many different departments of the Hoopa Valley Tribe, including the Hoopa Tribal Administration Department, Hoopa Development & Economic Program, Kimaw Medical Center and Hoopa Tribal Fisheries Department.

# EVERYTHING YOU WOULD LIKE TO KNOW ABOUT...

## AmeriCorps\*Hoopa Tribal Civilian Community Corps

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### BASIC AMERICORPS\*TCCC INFORMATION:

**Q:** *What is AmeriCorps?*

**A:** AmeriCorps is a national service program that engages thousands of Americans to get things done throughout the nation's urban and rural communities. There are currently more than 60,000 members serving in AmeriCorps\*NCCC, AmeriCorps\*TCCC, AmeriCorps\*Vista (Volunteering in Service to America), and over 600 other AmeriCorps programs throughout the country.

**Q:** *What is the AmeriCorps\*TCCC Mission?*

**A:** We will perform community service through our native communities to restore balance within our homes, families and environment. We will change our lifestyles to promote strength within our people beginning with ourselves and those we serve. We will overcome adversity, persevering as our people have done for hundreds of years and by doing so bring hope to our generation and to future generations. We will work together as teammates, friends & neighbors to complete our projects & achieve our goals. We will take responsibility for each other, ensuring our collective & individual growth, identifying each others needs & working together to meet them. We will find our paths, carefully mapping our potentials, wants & needs while honoring our families, traditions & the values they stand for.



**Q:** *What should I expect during my tour in the program?*

**A:** You will directly affect the future of AmeriCorps and National Service. Typically takes 6-9 months depending on how motivated you are. This is not a normal 9-5, Monday-Friday job. You will encounter many challenges as well as many opportunities to lead, learn, serve, and stretch-physically, mentally, emotionally and socially. Days will be long, service will be hard, but rewarding; physical and mental readiness will be important. You should be ready to live and serve in a community setting with a highly diverse group of people. There will be rules and regulations to follow which are upheld by your Team Leader. There will also be a lot of peer pressure from other members in the corps, it's a lot like high school. It takes a strong person to overcome the next 6-9 months of your life. Flexibility and an open mind are key to being successful and happy in AmeriCorps\*TCCC.

Q: *What is required to successfully complete the program and receive the educational award?*

A: You must finish the full 1,700 hours of community service. Independent service projects (ISP's) will be considered as a part of your service. Members will receive support from the staff in identifying and developing these ISP projects. If you depart the program early, there will be no educational award unless there is a compelling reason, in which case the educational award is prorated. Details are explained in your corps member handbook.

## WHAT HAPPENS WHEN I ARRIVE?



Q: *What will happen when Corps Members arrive on campus?*

A: Corps Members arrival consists of:

- Staff (in blue TCCC shirts) shuttles everyone from the bus station/airport to the TCCC Campus, which is a one hour trip.
- Upon arrival, Corps Members receive their Room Assignments. Corps Members will receive the keys to your room and dorm closet upon Drug & Alcohol test clearance. The key will open the outside door to your dorm, your room door and your own closet. The key will not open anything else.

Q: *May Corps Members have visitors?*

A: Yes, however, guests may not enter the dorms or stay overnight on campus. All visitors must check in with the TCCC staff on duty upon entering and leaving campus. **Visitors must be over 18 years of age unless they are accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.** All visits must be made to fit around your regular work schedule.

Q: *Do you conduct room inspections?*

A: Yes, we do conduct room inspections. They may or may not be announced. The purpose of these inspections is to ensure health, safety and cleanliness of the facility. Room inspections will also be conducted each payday prior to the dismissal of the corps on Friday's.

Q: *Are Corps Members free to decorate their own rooms?*

A: The hanging of pictures and posters is permitted. These items need to be in good taste and limited so as not to cause a fire hazard or permanent damage to walls. Nothing that portrays sexually explicit material or drug and/or alcohol, or violence will be permitted.

Q: *Are their laundry facilities in the residence halls?*

A: There is a washer and dryer in each dorm as well as Laundry room equipped with 3 washers and dryers. They operate at no cost to you. *However, you are responsible for providing your own laundry detergent, fabric softener, etc.*

Q: ***Will Corps Members have access to telephones?***

A: There is one telephone in the lounge for corps members use. There is no charge for local calls. Calling cards or phone cards will be required for long distance calls. You are welcome to bring a cell phone but because of the limited number of service providers in the area, some phones may not work. You will need to check with the local companies to find out which plans work and which do not.

Q: ***Where will Corps Members eat?***

A: All meals will be provided here at the AmeriCorps\*TCCC campus kitchen. There will be a main entrée and a few sides provided with each meal. All meals are prepared and cooked by a Corps Member on a daily basis. Throughout your service, you will be required to cook breakfast, lunch & dinner for your fellow team members.

- Sack Lunches for the work site
- for those who have a strictly natural food diets - *You will be responsible for any special dietary needs.*

Q: ***Will Corps Members be required to exercise?***

A: Physical Training (PT) is part of the AmeriCorps\*TCCC experience. During the members service year morning exercise will be Monday, Wednesday & Friday at 7am or 7pm as scheduled. Members are required to either walk or run a 1.5 miles.



Q: ***Are there recreational facilities available?***

A: ***On the campus*** we have an small weight room. In the lounge (“common area”), we have satellite television, free wi-fi (bring your own laptop/notebook-optional), vending machines, and a pool table. ***At particular areas within Hoopa***, there is access to a swimming pool, basketball courts (indoor and outdoor), softball/baseball fields, soccer fields, football fields, and the high school has an indoor weight room (you will need to check on availability when you arrive.)

Q: ***Is alcohol permitted in the dorms?***

A: No. Alcohol is not permitted anywhere on the TCCC campus, including within or outside any of the buildings. If anyone is found with alcoholic beverages, disciplinary action will be taken which could include termination. Smoking is only permitted outdoors, in a designated area only.

Q: ***Are Corps Members allowed to have automobiles on campus?***

A: Yes, you may bring your car for your use. You must have a current driver's license and valid registration. You must also provide a copy of your current insurance card. Personal cars are not allowed on SPIKE or at our project sites.

**\*\*TCCC cannot pay for mail postage, therefore the corps members must pay for this expense.**

# PROJECT QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

**Q: *Who develops TCCC projects?***

**A:** There is one staff member primarily responsible for developing projects throughout the region. The Project Manager works with non-profit organizations, and local, state, and federal agencies to identify service-learning projects in the five critical areas (education, environment, public safety, unmet human needs, & disaster relief). Project ideas and contacts from Corps Members and other members of the staff are encouraged and appreciated. The Project Manager and the TCCC Program Director assign the projects to the teams. The decisions are primarily based on availability of the teams and to timing and scope of the project. As much as possible, the staff aims to expose all teams to as wide a variety of projects as possible. **Q: *Can Corps Members specialize in one of the service areas?***

**A:** Our teams do not specialize in one service area. The TCCC is built on diversity of corps members and diversity of projects. Teams work on service learning projects to address communities' most pressing needs. Projects last from one day to two months. We try to have every team work in all service areas: education, environment, unmet human needs, homeland security and disaster relief, but there is no guarantee.

**Q: *What are local projects?***

**A:** Local projects are when a team stays at the campus and works on a project in Hoopa and close surrounding areas. 60% of the corps members service year will be completing community service projects within the Hoopa Valley Reservation and surrounding communities.


**Q: *What are SPIKES?***

**A:** A SPIKE is when your team undertakes a service project, which requires more than a 90-mile drive from campus to the site. These projects on average last 2-4 weeks and during this time, teams stay at temporary lodging. Your Team Leader receives a budget for each spike and the budget will consist of money for food and laundry (if necessary). Your Team Leader will decide how the team handles meals on SPIKE. If a project sponsor provides meals for your team, you will have limited options. When you are on spike, you have limited access to phones, Internet service and television.

**Q: *What will the hours be?***

**A:** Work hours are set by the particular project your team has been assigned; therefore, they will vary. They can range from working three weeks straight for 12-14 hours a day (such as disaster relief or fire fighting, where the need is great, therefore the hours are longer) to working closer to a regular work week (Monday—Saturday 7am-4pm). You must come prepared to have your daily schedule change on a moments notice. The sponsor will work with the Project Manager to determine the most appropriate schedule.

**1 Q: *Do we receive training for each project?***



A: Yes, training may be from pre-service (training held at campus) and/or at the project site. Some training may also consist of hands-on training. Each training will vary and some will receive certifications and others will not.

Q: ***How will the teams get to project sites?***

A: Your team will travel to the project site in a van or truck. The vehicle that you use will depend on the project your team is assigned to.

## WHAT IS CORPS MEMBER TRAINING?

Throughout your service year you will be involved in an intensive curriculum of training. This training will teach you everything you need to know to be successful here in your year as a TCCC Corps Member. It will be both hands on & classroom training. At times training require long hours both during the week and on some weekends. We strive to make the trainings interactive & p r o j e c t b a s e d .

You will cover some sessions such as: Community Meetings, Personal Health and Hygiene, TCCC policy and procedures, and residence life.

November through March are predominately training months. May through September are our busiest months, when we travel almost every two months.

**The specific trainings that you will receive will include:**

Tool Safety

Service Learning-preparation, action, reflection, and closure.

Project Deployment/Implementation-working with sponsors and site supervisors

Education Award Entitlements

Hoopa Valley Tribal Policies including: Fit for Duty, Workers Compensation, and Sexual Harassment

**You will also be trained as 1st Responders to Natural Disasters in the following areas:**

CPR/ First Aid

Over the Bank Rope Rescue –*offered in Jan/Feb/March*

Swift Water Rescue –*offered in Jan/Feb/March*

Disaster Preparedness and Relief

Basic 32 Firefighter Training—*offered in April/May*

Community Emergency Response Team Training

First Responders—*offered in January*

# TCCC Campus Fact Sheet



## About Hoopa

The Hoopa Valley Indian Reservation is the largest reservation in California. According to the Executive Order issued by President U.S. Grant on June 23, 1876, the Reservation encompasses 89,572 acres. As currently surveyed, the Reservation is nearly square with sides 12 miles in length or approximately 144 square miles. This area encompasses roughly 50% of the [Hupa aboriginal territory](#). The Reservation is located in the northeastern corner of Humboldt County in Northern California. It lies approximately 50 miles inland from the Pacific Ocean, and 300 miles north of San Francisco, California.

**About TCCC** The Hoopa Tribal Civilian Community Corps is residential program that provides training & job skills to the members. Typically a member will complete their term in 6-9 months. The Hoopa TCCC campus is the only Tribal Residential AmeriCorps program in the country.

TCCC's mission is that we will perform community service through our native communities to restore balance within our homes, families and environment. We will change our lifestyles to promote strength within our people beginning with ourselves and those we serve. We will overcome adversity, persevering as our people have done for hundreds of years and by doing so bring hope to our generation and to future generations. We will work together as teammates, friends and neighbors to complete our projects and achieve our goals. We will take responsibility for each other, ensuring our collective and individual growth, identifying each others needs & working together to meet them. We will find our paths, carefully mapping our potentials, wants and needs while honoring our families, traditions and the values they stand for.

In order to meet these objectives, TCCC has developed a service strategy that is responsive to the challenges posed by structural unemployment, a high rate of school drop out & substance abuse. We are currently in our 11th year of operation. We specialize in completing high-priority short-term service projects

in 5 issue areas: environment, education, public safety, unmet human needs and homeland security. Successful service projects include completing house-building and restoration projects with Habitat for Humanity, collaborating with the Hoopa Forestry Department on reforestation efforts, and other Tribal organizations. TCCC will continue to build on these relationships and assist them with their community projects. This past year's focus has been on environmental projects.

## Surrounding Areas

The TCCC campus is located about 6 miles from "downtown" Hoopa. The town of Willow Creek is 13 miles away and Weitchpec is 11 miles from Hoopa. The Nearest city is Blue Lake, McKinleyville and Eureka, which all are on the coast and approximately 45 to 60 miles away. Hoopa has one grocery store, one gas stations, one bank, one motel, one small casino and lots of places to swim, fish and do outdoor type activities. You will need to travel to the town/cities on the coast in order to shop, go to theaters or other activities. \*\*\*TCCC will make an effort to provide a day trip to Eureka area on the Saturday following payday.

## The Campus

The designated area is on a prime real estate adjacent to the pristine Trinity River with (4) modular buildings & a storage unit located on it. The 4 buildings are all handicap accessible & include a kitchen/lounge which members use to prepare & cook meals, serve food, eat, watch TV, access computer/Wi-Fi/telephone, vending machines and a pool table. Behind the lounge is a weight room for corps members use. There are two dorms that will house men and women each. The dorm room includes 2 beds, a dresser & closet. Each dorm has a washer/dryer unit & restrooms with showers. The 4<sup>th</sup> building is used for staff to perform the general duties of TCCC. This building is equipped with a conference room, restroom & office spaces. The facility also comes equipped with a storage unit which holds all work tools, a basketball court & an outdoor picnic area.

Public transportation is very limited. On campus, you have access to the KT Net Bus Stop (only operates Mon-Friday) which will take you to Willow Creek to transfer to another bus system to take you to Eureka. There are no local bus systems within the Hoopa Reservation. Personal automobiles are allowed on the facility and we encourage you to bring one. Bicycles are welcome and will come in handy for getting around the area. You are not allowed to keep your bicycles in your room and must bring a lock for outside.

# CODE OF HONOR



## Strive for Excellence in All that We Do

### Recognize and Respect Ourselves and Others

Do unto others, as we would appreciate that they would do unto us. This includes (among other things):

Being as positive as often as possible, it can be infectious.

Being truthful at all costs, including to ourselves;

Not stealing – this is not only unkind, but also illegal and will not be tolerated (Steal there's no appeal);

Helping others whenever possible;

Stopping radio and TV volumes before they reach the ears of our peers;

Not abusing sick time – feeling less than 100% is different from being SICK.

Remembering that the phone in the lounge is for everyone;

Respecting quiet hours, which begin at 10 p.m.

Being responsible for our living environment, including maintaining the cleanliness of the common bath, hallways, and lounge.

### Get There and Be On Time

*You're late, your leader is irate!*

We are to be on time and ready to fully participate in all AmeriCorps\*TCCC functions. Absences from the work site or from other mandatory AmeriCorps\*TCCC functions are considered a breach and mandate disciplinary action.

### Be Positive Role Models

The AmeriCorps\*TCCC is committed to setting and achieving high standards. We, the Corps community, contribute to this by conducting ourselves professionally, especially when engaged in Corps activities, both on and off campus. Take pride in our teams, the Corps, and ourselves.

### Wear Our Uniforms with Pride

Wear our uniforms whenever we represent the AmeriCorps\*TCCC unless a special arrangement has been made with your Team Leaders and/or other TCCC Staff. In uniform, we represent not only ourselves but our entire organization; therefore, we must refrain from wearing any accessories which either are or may in any way be viewed as offensive, profane, or unsafe. Further, as a matter of course and courtesy, no hats are to be worn inside buildings

during normal business operations, this applies to males and females alike.

### Participate Fully

We are expected to take an active role in getting things done for the corps as well as for our own personal growth. Passively doing nothing can be just as damaging to teams and the Corps as actively doing something wrong. Take charge of your personal actions and personal learning.

### Respect Authority

*Uncooperation is an unpaid vacation!*

Part of becoming an effective leader is learning to work and excel within a structure of authority. This does not mean that we are expected to follow instructions blindly; rather, we are to respect authority and office of the instruction giver and carry out the directive with an eye toward learning and personal growth.

### Abstain from the Threat or Use of Physical Force or Violence

*Throw a punch, gone before lunch!*

This includes verbal threats, no matter how intended; violent ultimatums; physical gestures or anything else which suggests that force or violence will be used or is suggested as a course of action; and carrying concealed or openly displayed weapons, including guns, knives, or other legal or illegal implements intended to harm others, even in cases of self-defense.

### Abstain from Illegal Use or Possession of Drugs and Alcohol

*Booze it; lose it! Get high; good-bye!*

This includes being under the influence of drugs/alcohol at work or having either substances in your possession while at work or in any AmeriCorps\*TCCC buildings. Also, the State of California legal drinking age is 21 years of age; any use of alcohol by under-aged or use of illegal drugs by anyone will not be tolerated.

# Packing List



*The following is a list of recommended items,  
that TCCC does NOT provide:*


- **Clothing:** pants, work jeans, shorts, t-shirts, bathrobe, casual attire, sweat-ers, jacket, socks, undergarments, etc. (What you would normally wear but on a smaller scale). (Note: Corps Members are issued minimal uniforms including boots, t-shirts (5), sweatshirts (2), visor, beanie, coveralls (2) , backpack (1) and winter jacket to wear on projects.
- **Footwear:** Work boots (no steel toe), casual, shower.
- **Heavy Socks and Insoles:** (for TCCC boots)
- **Personal Toiletries:** deodorant, shampoo, soap, tooth brush & toothpaste, hair dryer, curling iron, etc.
- **Bedding & pillows:** Linens are not provided. Please bring your own bedding including pillows, that will fit a regular size twin size bed.
- **Towels and Washcloths**
- **Eyewear:** Sunglasses, extra pair of eye glasses, contacts, contact solution. (TCCC will buy one pair of prescription eye glasses or contacts, valued no more than \$100.00)
- **Entertainment (Please consider but it's optional):** Bicycles, musical instrument, radio, books, laptop computer or notebook, I-Pod, video games, TV, etc. NO HOUSE STEREOs! There is no taxi service or bus systems on our reservation. KT Net Bus system only operates during weekdays. Please plan accordingly. TCCC will make every effort to do a field trip every other Saturday after payday, to Eureka, CA. (1 hour away from campus)
- **Personal Decorations:** Photos of family & friends. Posters, etc. No Sexual Harassing or paraphernalia photos or posters are allowed to hung in your room.
- **Clothes Hangers:**
- **Insect Repellent, Calamine Lotion or Hydrocortisone cream, etc.** (We have lots of mosquitoes and poison oak)
- **Medications (Must show prescription to Director)**
- **Laundry Detergent:** The laundry facilities are available to you at no cost.
- **Laundry Basket/Bag, Alarm Clock, Throw Rugs**
- **Extra set of car keys if you bring your own vehicle**
- **RECCOMENDED: Tent, Flashlight**

*\*\*We provide sleeping bags & tents when needed for SPIKE projects, but we recommend that you bring your own.*

# The Beginning of Your Journey...

We are awaiting your arrival and excited to meet you as you began to dedicate the next nine months of your life to national service.

### *In Hoopa, CA:*

## From Happy Camp, Ca.
